
The Elves and the Shoemaker

One evening, the shoemaker cut out the shoes, all ready to make the next day. He left the pieces of leather on the table. Tired and weary, he went to bed.



in the morning, the shoes were finished and ready for sale.


This went on day after day. So good was his trade that the shoemaker soon became very rich.


